

Library Director Report August 2023 Anita Marple

Story Time at the Fremont County Fair: County Fair Director Pat Hart and I have an ongoing conversation about partnering opportunities between the Fair and the Library. This year we tried Story Time during Fair week. As a former children's librarian, I took on this activity for my own enjoyment and to get a firsthand look at how this would work. Of the four days, the first was the best with a group of six children and their parents (and a few older Fair kids). Not only did we have a fun story time, but also it was a beneficial opportunity to represent the library system and distribute information about library cards and programs. I look forward to evaluating with Pat and planning for next year.

Website: After we finish the individual branch calendars, the new website will go live. The technical part of the process might take a day or so for all the connections to switchover. This will be a "soft launch," so no specific advertising will be done while we work out any bugs. Once we have developed more online content opportunities, we will begin promoting the new site in earnest. Mid-September is the soft launch goal.

Internet Filtering Issue: I invested a significant amount of time reviewing staff response to the July 31 patron incident and investigating the internet filtering issue. Over the years this topic comes up for evaluation and discussion, which I consider to be a healthy process. As technology develops and as behaviors change, it is wise to review policy and procedure. County ISS Kevin Shultz and I will be researching various software filtering options for the board's consideration in October or November.

Bookmarked Literary Arts Book Club: The Bookmarked Literary Arts Festival began as a Lander Library event coordinated by former library staff member Ami Vincent. The Festival is now a separate entity from the library, but a strong partnership continues. This year we are coordinating a county-wide book club event featuring Chris Bohjalian's book *Midwives*. The author is the featured speaker for the Bookmarked Festival this year, and Ami and I will be hosting a book club event at each library during September. The book is available in print at each library and through Overdrive with the Libby app.

Annual Report: The draft FCLS FY 2022-2023 Annual Report is ready for library board review and then presentation to the county commissioners.

Staffing Updates: We have filled six of the seven new 12-hour Library Assistant I positions, and this has enabled the return to year-round Saturday open hours. This achieves a goal we set back in 2020 when budget reductions necessitated cutting staff and hours of access.

I also received approval from the county commissioners for staff position changes at the Dubois Branch. The change involves making the part-time, non-benefitted Library Assistant I position a part-time, benefitted Library Assistant II position. The part-time, benefitted Custodial/Maintenance position has become a part-time, non-benefitted Custodial/Maintenance position. This change is the result of a needs assessment for the Dubois Branch.



Wyoming Library Association Conference: At the October 4-6 conference, I will be participating in leading a session for the legislative process and a session on developing literacy programming through readers' theater. This year five library staff will attend the conference, and we are appreciative of the FC Library Foundation's grant support to make this possible.

August was our month for patron appreciation and library awareness giveaways:

Book Bags Yard Signs Flashlights Jelly Beans

Thank you to the Fremont County Library Foundation for the grant funding for these items. The majority of the super-popular book bags are gone, and only a few flash lights remain. We started the jelly bean container giveaway in September. All these items have the FCLS logo and are a fun way to promote our libraries.

The third week of August 2023 we initiated the FCLS/WRTA Bus Tickets program. Seven Hundred and fifty tickets were purchased for WRTA with a grant from the Episcopal Church of Wyoming. The grant purpose was to extend public library services to the Wind River Indian Reservation, and I have observed a significant need for transportation access over the years. To get a bus ticket a person needs to come into the Lander or Riverton libraries. Tickets are limited to one per person per week while supplies last. Bus riders must be at least 18 years old unless accompanied by a guardian.

Wednesday, August 30, 2023, I actually rode the bus home. It's been a few years since I have had to do that. This summer, my granddaughter used the bus weekly. It was interesting to see who was using our mass transportation. It was an enjoyable ride.

Saturday, September 2nd, 2023, I washed and scrubbed the Riverton's Library outside stage. I think it's important to stay fresh on all the staff's duties and experiences. While, I was scrubbing, one of our regular visitors, Martin, started to pitch in and I was grateful.



In Riverton and Dubois, we have made VOX Books available for public checkout. We purchased these last year with a portion of the ALA grant money. These combination book/audiobook products are great for literacy development. Riverton Youth Services Lead Librarian Kirbie Despain gave VOX book talks in Riverton and Dubois.
